#### **BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL NOTE**

Henry C. Minor (1841-1898) was a sugar planter of Southdown Plantation in Terrebonne Parish, Louisiana. He inherited the plantation from his father, William J. Minor (1807-1869). After Henry's death, the plantation was managed by his sister, Katherine (Kate) Minor. When Henry's daughter, Mary Louisa Minor (born 1886), married David Washington Pipes (1886-1968), Pipes assumed management of the plantation. Pipes served as president of the American Sugar Cane League and was active in the Republican Party in Louisiana.

#### SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

These papers relate to the estate of Henry C. Minor and contain letters, maps, photographs, reports, and items reflecting the management, reorganization, and financing of sugar plantations, including the Southdown Plantation in Terrebonne Parish, Louisiana, especially during the economic depression in the 1930s.

Many items relate to sugar technology and the revival of the Louisiana sugar industry in the twentieth century through the introduction of fungus resistant sugarcane, specifically P.O.J. cane. Included are materials on tick eradication and the Louisiana rice industry. A scrapbook (1912-1952) concerns P.O.J. cane growing, sugar refining, and damage through storms and flooding.

Printed items include books, circulars, periodicals, clippings, and pamphlets concerning the sugar industry, agriculture, and commerce, chiefly in Louisiana and the United States.
