BELL (WILLIAM R.) PAPERS 1842-1941

BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL NOTE

William R. Bell (circa 1814-1874), a native of Scotland, was a mortician and owner of Union Stables on Carondelet Street in New Orleans, Louisiana. He and Jessie Russell Fisher wed in 1869.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The bulk of the papers consist of business correspondence and records of Bell's stable and mortuary. Items relative to Bell's Union Stables include orders and statements for rental of horses, carriages, and buggies to Federal soldiers occupying New Orleans. Correspondence from Bell's relatives in Scotland, Canada, Michigan, and California discuss, among other things, economic conditions, family news, the Civil War, and gold mining (1842-1869). Of note is a letter relating the scarcity of food throughout Scotland and Britain resulting from the Irish potato famine (February 26, 1847), as well as a letter from Minnesota discussing a Native American massacre (September 24, 1862). Also included are a biography (1941) of Bell by Isabel Fisher Molony and a photograph of Bell (circa 1870).

Volumes are comprised of a set of bound letters (1860-1867), which contains requests and instructions for exhumation, embalming, and transport of bodies of Federal soldiers to their families in the North, and a letter press copy book (1862-1867).
