#### **BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL NOTE**

Brigadier General Charles Russell Suter (1842 - 1920) graduated from the United State Military Academy at West Point in 1862, served throughout the Civil War, and was a prominent figure in the post-war mapping and "improvement" of the Mississippi River. In the 1870s he created the work, Map of a reconnaissance of the Mississippi River from Cairo, Ill's. to New Orleans, La. To accompany the report on that portion of the third subdivision of the Mississippi route to the seaboard made in accordance with an Act of Congress approved June 23rd, 1874, published in 1878. The Map was published as an atlas consisting of 31 sections (scale 1 inch: 1 mile) showing sand, wrecks, five kinds of riparian woods, towns, cities, and plantations.

The Corp of Engineers honored Suter for his work by naming a river snagboat after him, ca. 1885. Unfortunately, then-current Army rules disallowed naming of a vessel after a living person. As Charles R. Suter – ranked a Major at the time - was alive and serving on the Corps' Missouri River commission, the snagboat was renamed *Missouri* and spent most of her operational life on the lower Missouri River with occasional activity further up-river.

James Reese & Sons, Pittsburg, PA., began construction of the *C.R. Suter* in 1885. Three years later, the *C.R. Suter* began operating on the Missouri River pulling snags, clearing drift heaps and stumps, and felling trees. She had an overall length of 187 feet, an overall beam of 52 feet, a depth of 7 feet, and displaced 510 tons. Her boilers generated steam at 100 pounds per square inch to power steam engines turning her side-wheels sufficiently to run 5 miles per hour upstream and 12 miles per hours downstream. Construction contract cost was \$115,000.00. There is no record of her finish cost with outfitting.

After operating on the Missouri River for 40 years, the *Missouri* burned at Gasconade, MO., 1928 July 29. The wreck was dragged behind a dike that broke off the next year exposing the wreck. The dredge *Kappa* disposed of the remains in 1929.

#### SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

These 20 photographic images provide visual documentation of 3 different aspects of the Corps of Engineers river fleet:

- 1. Four images show the Mississippi River fleet winter quarters in Chester, Illinois, January 1887. Of these four, the first 2 images provide different views of the fleet iced in at winter quarters. The next 2 are the same print of the U. S. snagboat *Horatio G. Wright* in winter quarters.
- 2. A single image shows the U. S. snagboat *John R. Meigs* moored at the river's edge, perhaps in St. Louis.
- 3. Fifteen images document the construction (11 images) and operation (4 images) of the U. S. snagboat *C. R. Suter* later renamed *Missouri*.

In one of the construction images, pasted to a pole near the construction site, is a poster with the date 1885. One of the later images of the *C. R. Suter* in operation includes an American flag with 38 stars, which dates it to some time before November 1889. Using this internal evidence we have dated these images no earlier than 1885 and no later than November 1889.
