BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL NOTE

As a doctoral student at Louisiana State University, Julia Rose worked as a research assistant to Dr. Petra M. Hendry and Dr. Jay D. Edwards researching the history and development of the Old South Baton Rouge area in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Old South Baton Rouge (OSBR) is the area between LSU and Downtown Baton Rouge and encompasses roughly three-square miles. The primary subject of Rose's research on OSBR focused on the history of its urban development and specifically the African American population of the area.

Since graduating LSU, Rose has held director/curator roles at various museums including Homewood Museum at John Hopkins University, West Baton Rouge Museum, the Washington D.C. Historical Society (formerly the Columbia Historical Society), East Tennessee Historical Society, and Magnolia Mound Plantation. She has served as a peer reviewer for the American Alliance of Museums, a board member for the Hammond Harwood House, and on the editorial board for the Journal for Museum Education. Rose was also an assistant professor teaching museum studies at LSU and Southern University of New Orleans.

Rose's research interests focus on interpreting difficult histories and documenting historical enslaved population communities for museum interpretations. Her book, *Interpreting Difficult History at Museums and Historic Sites* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2016), addresses museum learning and historical oppression.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The Julia Rose Old South Baton Rouge collection (2004-2005, 2013, undated) contains research materials used by Rose for the "Old South Baton Rouge: Identifying Sites of Historical Significance" research project under the advisory of Dr. Petra M. Hendry and Dr. Jay D. Edwards. The materials were originally filed in a binder with divided sections and the corresponding arrangement of this collection has maintained the original order as found in Rose's binder. The collection materials include Architectural Survey papers, newspaper clippings, historical phonebook and City Directory materials, maps of OSBR, information on urban development of former plantation lands, and handwritten notes. The collection also includes a rough draft of Rose's "Histories and Cultures of 'Old' South Baton Rouge 1722-1920," which is in Folder 1 of Box 1. This rough draft includes a narrative overview of Rose's research, a list of archival sources reviewed, as well as an appendix which contains an East Baton Rouge Parish Mortality Schedule for the years 1850, 1860, 1870, and 1880, a record of Louisiana's Households of Free People of Color in 1810 and 1820, Baton Rouge City Directories for the years 1856, 1895, 1899, and 1906 (highlighting the African American population, a list of Baton Rouge subdivisions, and an index of oral history tapes for OSBR at T. Harry Williams Center for Oral History.
